Ayaan: Exactly! And when you combine an independent and dependent clause, you get a complex sentence.

Meerab: That's really helpful! Can you give me an example?

Ayaan: Sure thing! Here's an example of a complex sentence: "I went to the store because I needed milk." The independent clause is "I went to the store," and the dependent clause is "because I needed milk."

Meerab: Ah, I get it now! The dependent clause gives extra information about why you went to the store.

Ayaan: Exactly! And that's the power of clauses and sentence structure - they help us convey meaning and relationships between ideas in our writing and speaking!
